

Tudors and Elizabethans: A Port of Discovery Key Stage 2

About this pre-visit resource

This pre-visit resource gives you detailed information about the session you are attending with your class, as well as some extra tips about our venue, so that you can be well prepared for your visit to The Box.

About this workshop

This workshop takes place in the **Simmons Learning Room** at The Box. It explores some of the amazing expeditions that left from and returned to Plymouth during the Tudor and Elizabethan period. Students take part in a range of hands on activities, to explore the impact that these voyages would have had on Plymouth and her people.

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Detailed Workshop Outline

The session begins with the Learning Facilitator introducing Plymouth as a port, by looking at Plymouth's location on an interactive digital map.

- 1. The students discover what Plymouth and the world were like at the beginning of the Tudor period, viewing a map that indicates the impact of the Treaty of Tordesillas on world power. The find out about John Cabot's voyage in 1497, as well as those of Francis Drake and John Hawkins later. The Facilitator will introduce that the students will be discovering the impact of these and other global voyages on Plymouth, through taking on the characters of different people in the past.
- 2. The students then take part in a 'Pack you ships chest' activity. Assuming different characters that would be on board a ship, they discover what life on board would have been like, by selecting and choosing objects that they should take with them. Their choices are guided by information about the different roles on board a ship.
- 3. Following this the students find out about how ships would navigate around the world during this period. They discover navigation instruments including a logand-line, traverse board and astrolabe, and undertake challenges to learn how to use them.

- 4. The students then "return" from their voyage, with a ship laden with cargo from around the world. They take part in a trading game, assuming different characters who would have been present in Plymouth during this period. They have to negotiate the best prices and trade goods with each other, discovering the types of goods that were imported and exported from Plymouth along the way.
- 5. The session concludes with the students examining a historic map of Plymouth from the end of the Elizabethan period, demonstrating how it changed during this time. The students discuss the impact of global trade during this time, and reflect on its continued impact today.
