What's in the box?

This Loan Box is full of amazing samples of building materials used on various buildings in the city. The materials were kindly donated by Albion Stone, Bardon Aggregates, Breedon Aggregates, Burlington Stone, Ibstock, Plymouth Stone, STO and TECU.

Materials

Cornish Granite Black Granite Green Westmorland Slate Plymouth Limestone Portland Stone Dartmoor Granite Delabole Slate Copper - Patina White Render Red Brick Cornish Granite - silver background with varying small sized flecks in black, grey and white.

Used for the support columns of the Tamar Bridge and parts of the Royal William Yard. This piece is from De Lank Quarry, Cornwall. Supplied by Breedon Aggregates.

Black Granite - Dense black with small specks of silver and a polished finish.

Used as the base of many buildings on Armada Way. It comes from India. Supplied by Plymouth Stone.

Green Westmorland Slate - Mid green, often highlighted with contrasting and tonal changes / contrasts.

Used as cladding on the Civic Centre, Crown Courts and the Post Office, St Andrew's Cross. This piece is from Cumbria. Supplied by Burlington Stone. Plymouth Limestone - Coloured patterns with veins of white, streaks of red in the background and shades of grey.

Used as paving on the Barbican and outside The Box as paving and cladding, along with many buildings across the city. This piece is from Moorcroft Quarry in Plymstock, supplied by Bardon Aggregates.

Portland Stone - A fine grained, light crea, granular and sometimes fossiliferous, with a honed or dressed finish.

Used on the facade of many Plymouth buildings, including Dingles, Derry's and Debenhams. This stone is often confused for concrete and has led to Plymouth's occassional reputation as a 'concrete city' - which is totally wrong! It is sourced from Dorset and was supplied by Albion Stone.

Dartmoor Granite - Silver with varying larger sized flecks in black, grey, yellow and white.

Used on the columns of the Royal Bank of Scotland, supplied by Plymouth Stone.

Delabole Slate - Dense grey with green tones.

Used on the base of the Civic Centre. From Cornwall, supplied by Plymouth Stone.

Copper - Patina - Over time and with weathering, copper changes from its brown tones to turquoise.

Used on the Unitarian and Baptist Churches on Catherine and Notte Street and on the Royal Bank of Scotland. Supplied by TECU.

White Render - White with a large granular texture. Used on newer buildings in the city, such as Pinnacle Quay and Plymouth College of Art. Supplied by STO.

Red Brick - Found on a few buildings in the city centre, such as the former Western Mornign News building on New George Street and Christ the King Church, Notte Street. Supplied by Ibstock. Visit our website for the latest offers, news and projects for schools and to book your experience with us:
